Hailing from Cincinnati, Ellery's sound is best described as Sarah McLachlan meets Ben Folds. Their shows are infectious and enveloping, with swirling sounds, loud louds, quiet quiets and "a voice no less than mesmerizing" (Asheville Mountain Xpress).

**NewFound Road** -- Friday, February 24 · 8pm · Tickets: \$15 -- Formed in 2001, NewFound Road has been called one of the most exciting bluegrass bands of the new millennium. Appearances with The Swell Season, Joe Diffie, Rock-n-Roll Hall of Famer Mavis Staples, Grammy nominated R&B artist Ryan Shaw, folk icon Judy Collins and a long list of country and bluegrass artists and legends, the group has garnered quite a following. 2010 saw their debut on stage at The Grand Ole Opry. Their music is powerful and streamlined, featuring hard-driving, soulful contemporary bluegrass as well as achingly beautiful country and pop ballads.

Screaming Orphans -- Friday, March 23 · 8pm · Tickets: \$15 -- Joan, Angela, Gráinne and Marie are a self described pop-rock band of four fun, high-spirited, musically-obsessed sisters from Ireland. The quartet traveled to the United States to support Sinead O'Connor on a tour in 1997 and haven't left since. Screaming Orphans take their musical cues from the Beatles, R.E.M., Indigo Girls, Abba and traditional Irish music. With their mix of traditional and contemporary, they bring a sound comparable to the Bangles or the Cranberries.



**Neil Jacobs** -- Sunday, March 4 · 2pm · Tickets: \$10 -- Neil Jacobs is truly a masterful performer on the 12-string acoustic guitar. He explores many styles with music diverse as Gypsy, World, Balkan Folk, Jazz, Classical and Modern Fingerstyle, while transforming his 12-string acoustic guitar into his own personal orchestra. Audience members not only take in music of the world, but also stories of Neil's international travels.

**Table for 5** -- Sunday, May 20 · 2pm · Tickets: \$15 -- This Chicago-based quintet enchants audiences with unique vocal harmonies and musical styling. Table for 5 sings timeless tunes with a trademark twist. What started with a holiday performance has become a full-fledged touring music experience with a repertoire including big band, Broadway hits and groovy tunes from the 60s and

beyond. Group members' credits include the national tours of Les Miserables and Sophisticated Ladies as well as extensive experience on the biggest stages in Chicago.




in contrasts that shows how two bold and identifiable voices can mesh together, making something bigger and better. They're top-shelf country bound....so get on board!

**U.S. Navy Band Sea Chanters** -- Monday, March  $5 \cdot 7.30 \, \text{pm} \cdot \text{Free Admission}$  -- As the United States Navy's official chorus, this ensemble performs a variety of music ranging from traditional choral music, including sea chanteys and patriotic fare, to opera, Broadway and contemporary music. Under the leadership of Senior Chief Musician Georgina L. Todd, the group performs for the public throughout the U.S. Consisting of members from the Navy School of Music, the all-male group was originally organized just for a specific event. Their immediate success found the members transferred to the Navy Band, officially named the Sea Chanters, and tasked with



perpetuating the songs of the sea. In 1980, the group added women to their ranks and expanded their repertoire to include everything from Brahms to Broadway. This unique opportunity is a must see.

Blues Brothers Revue -- Friday, April 13 · 8pm · Tickets: \$22 (\$10 College Rush\*) -- It seems like yesterday that brothers Jake and Elwood Blues, played by John Belushi and Dan Aykroyd, invited the world to join them on a "mission from God." The hit movie *The Blues* Brothers was a loveable tale of redemption about the pair of paroled convicts, who set out to save the Catholic orphanage in which they grew up. As the story goes, they re-formed their rhythm and blues band, The Blues Brothers, and organized a concert to raise \$5,000 to pay off the debt and save the day. But things never went according to plan. Now, thirty years later, the Blues Brothers live on in the Official



Blues Brothers Revue, starring Wayne Catania as Jake and Kieron Lafferty as Elwood. This Blues Brothers Revue is the only Blues Brothers show to be officially sanctioned by Dan Aykroyd and wife of the late John Belushi, Judith Belushi Pisano. Don't miss the fun!
